Dear Chairmen Thune and Shuster and Ranking Members Nelson and DeFazio,

We write to convey our strong support for Section 3129 of the Senate Federal Aviation Administration (FAA) Reauthorization Act of 2018, which will afford airline passengers protections from unreasonable fees.

Today, airlines charge passengers fees for basic aviation services, such as changing or cancelling flight reservations and checking luggage. Many air carriers charge passengers change and cancellation fees up to \$200, even though the airline can still resell the vacated seat and the fee itself may be greater than the original air fare. Further, major U.S. air carriers now charge domestic air travelers baggage fees from \$30 for the first checked bag to \$150 for the third checked bag, yet there appears to be no appreciable cost increase for processing the additional bags. In fact, a 2017 report from the Government Accountability Office found that few airlines consider the costs of the services provided when setting the price of their ancillary fees. <sup>1</sup>

Section 3129 would establish tailored, responsible protections from unreasonable airline fees. The provision directs the Department of Transportation (DOT) to assess whether change and cancellation, baggage, and other fees are reasonable and proportional to the costs of the services provided. In addition, the DOT is directed to ensure change and cancellation fees are not unreasonable or disproportionate to the costs borne by the airline when a flight reservation is modified or cancelled.
