	A BILL prohibit the use of United States embassies or consulates a raising funds for foreign political parties or candidates.
1	Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representa-
2	tives of the United States of America in Congress assembled,
3	SECTION 1. SHORT TITLE.
4	This Act may be cited as the "Opposing Foreign
5	Fundraising at United States Embassies Act of 2020" or
6	the "OFF U.S. Embassies Act of 2020".
7	SEC. 2. FINDINGS.
8	Congress makes the following findings:

(1) The promotion of democratic institutions

and free and fair elections is a key foreign policy ini-

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tiative of the United States, carried out by the Department of State through its embassies, diplomats, programs, and policies around the world.

- (2) Meeting with and building relationships with a range of political parties in foreign countries are appropriate and important functions consistent with the duties of any United States Ambassador or representative of the United States Government abroad.
- (3) It is the longstanding and bipartisan practice of the United States to encourage democratic norms, free and fair elections, rule of law, and free speech abroad, without regard for political party or affiliation.
- (4) The use of United States embassy or consulate grounds, or the grounds of any other United States diplomatic post, to raise funds for any foreign political party or candidate in a foreign democratic electoral process is inappropriate and distinct from longstanding Department of State efforts to engage with foreign persons, including democracy activists and representatives of political parties, to advance democratic institutions and universal values around the world.

1 (5) On September 10, 2020, United States Am-2 bassador to the Netherlands Pete Hoekstra held a 3 private event for a Dutch political party and its do-4 nors at the United States Embassy in The Hague. 5 (6) The invitations to the event asked guests to 6 join the United States Embassy "at the invitation of 7 the Forum for Democracy and Pete Hoekstra," and 8 included contact details for the "Head of Fund-9 raising" of that foreign political party. 10 (7) Prior donors to the political party were in-11 vited and attended the event at the United States 12 Embassy. 13 (8) The leader of the foreign political party 14 used the event at the United States Embassy to 15 speak about campaign strategy and to display a 16 video made ahead of the 2021 electoral campaign in 17 the Netherlands. 18 (9) Following news reports highlighting the 19 similarities between the September 10, 2020, event 20 held at the United States Embassy and a political 21 fundraiser, Dutch lawmakers raised concerns, with 22 one member of parliament calling on the Dutch For-23 eign Ministry to investigate whether Ambassador 24 Hoekstra had "facilitated a fund raising event for a

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political party".

1	(10) Such behavior is part of a pattern in which
2	Department of State officials under President Don-
3	ald J. Trump have publicly engaged in political ac-
4	tivities that break with the longstanding practice of
5	not using one's official position to lend support to
6	particular parties or candidates, domestic or foreign,
7	with whom one shares a partisan affinity.
8	(11) In 2018, United States Ambassador to
9	Germany Richard Grenell said, from his official resi-
10	dence in Berlin, "I absolutely want to empower
11	other conservatives throughout Europe" and praised
12	the leader of an Austrian political party, leading
13	multiple German political figures to publicly rebuke
14	the United States Ambassador for political inter-
15	ference.
16	SEC. 3. PROHIBITION ON HOSTING OF FOREIGN PARTY PO-
17	LITICAL EVENTS AT UNITED STATES EMBAS-
18	SIES.
19	(a) In General.—No Federal funds may be obli-
20	gated or expended to host a fundraising event for, or on
21	behalf of, a foreign political party or candidate at a United
22	States embassy or consulate or any other United States
23	diplomatic post.
24	(b) Fundraising Event Defined.—In this section,
25	the term "fundraising event" means an event intended to

- 2 didate, including by knowingly facilitating contact between

- 5 (c) Restriction on Entertainment and Rep-

- 7 Service Act of 1980 (22 U.S.C. 4085) is amended by add-

- 9 vide for official receptions or pay expenses related to ac-
- 10 tivities by the Department or the Service, hosted by a

- 14 (d) Additional Restriction on Expendi-
- 15 Tures.—Section 4(b)(2)(H) of the State Department
- 16 Basic Authorities Act of 1956 (22 U.S.C. 2671(b)(2)(H))
- 17 is amended by inserting ", other than functions at a
- 18 United States embassy or consulate or any other United
- 19 States diplomatic post intended to raise funds for or on
- 20 behalf of a foreign political party or candidate" after "al-
- 21 lowances".
- 22 (e) REVISION OF DSSR AND FAM.—
- 23 (1) In General.—The Secretary of State shall
- 24 revise the Department of State Standardized Regu-
- 25 lations (DSSR) and the Foreign Affairs Manual

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(FAM) to prohibit the use of a United States embassy or consulate or any other United States diplomatic post in a manner intended to raise funds for or on behalf of a foreign political party or candidate, reflect the prohibitions on expenditures under this section, and discourage any activity hosted by a United States embassy or consulate or other United States diplomatic post that could be construed as promoting the financial interest of any foreign political party or candidate relative to others engaged in a democratic electoral process.

- (2) CERTIFICATION.—Not less than 90 days after the date of the enactment of this Act, the Secretary shall certify to the appropriate congressional committees that the revisions required under paragraph (1) have been made.
- (3) APPROPRIATE CONGRESSIONAL COMMITTEES DEFINED.—In this subsection, the term "appropriate congressional committees" means the Committee on Foreign Relations of the Senate and the Committee on Foreign Affairs of the House of Representatives.
